

Queen Anne houses are meant to be colorful. Architectural details are highlighted with dark vivid colors and contrasting hues; greens, oranges, reds, maroons, grays, browns, tans, and olives are dominant colors. The walls of a Queen Anne house may be painted one color, while doors, window sashes, trim, and decorative shingles are painted other colors; five separate colors can be painted on a single house. If a Queen Anne displays both wood shingles and wood siding, than the shingles should be painted or stained a different color than the siding. If a Queen Anne includes masonry wall cladding, the inherent color of the brick or stone should be considered when selecting paint colors. It is important to emphasize the many textures of these highly ornate houses and the more ornate a house, the more paint colors can be chosen.
***Unpainted brick or stone should never be painted as it could drastically alter the home's original character and traps moisture inside walls.
